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From the Chief Executive Officer

Dear Parents and Carers,

As we approach the end of the Autumn Term, I wanted to start this newsletter by thanking you for your support since the full opening of schools in September. Your support for your child's school is greatly appreciated by every member of staff and has helped ensure our schools are able to operate as smoothly as we possibly can in these challenging times.

I would also like to pay tribute to every member of staff in our schools. A huge amount of work goes in on a daily basis just to be able to operate effectively in line with government guidance and our staff have worked incredibly hard to ensure that every child continues to receive an outstanding education. Our schools have been able to stay open for the vast majority of students this term and, if a group or 'bubble' has had to close for 14 days, we have been able to switch to our remote learning provision. The work that our schools undertook in the summer term to prepare for remote learning has meant that we have been able to keep education going even when some pupils are not able to be in school. Hopefully, as we go through 2021, we can start to move back to normal operations in school, but will only be able do this when we are directed by the government that it is safe to do so.

One of the impacts of the restrictions placed on schools has been the need to significantly reduce the number of visitors onto site. For secondary schools, this has meant that their traditional Open Evenings couldn't take place and for Primary Schools their prospective parent tours have also been significantly impacted. Never daunted, our schools put together short films that show prospective parents around their school and what their school offers parents. NSPCC Speak Out, Stay Safe

We have very much enjoyed meeting Buddy from the NSPCC Speak Out, Stay Safe programme in Assembly.



Buddy, a friendly, green speech bubble, who believes that children should be able to speak out to someone if they are worried or unhappy gave the children lots of advice on staying safe. It has been great to see the children already using the

language and taking onboard Buddy's advice.

Speak out Stay safe is a safeguarding programme for children aged 5- to 11-years-old and it helps children to understand the following:

- abuse in all its forms and how to recognise signs of abuse
- that abuse is never a child's fault and that they have the right to be safe
- where to get help and the sources of help available to them, including the Childline service.

It is vitally important for us to support the children to feel confident to ask for help if they need it and this is integral in our school ethos and safeguarding policy. We would like to thank the NSPCC for their fantastic support.

Health Champions

This term we have launched our 'Happy and Healthy Lunchtimes' project which is part of 'The Children's Health Project' wellbeing initiative. Each class in Year 1 and 2 has been asked to nominate two Health Champions who will be helping to keep our lunchtimes happy and healthy.

National Winners!



We have also started our family dining lunchtime service. The reception aged pupils are learning to lay the tables with plates, knives, forks and cups. They then pour the water, ready for their friends to join them at lunch. They learn to pass each other the cold foods (salads and breads), while an adult helps to serve them their main meals. We are really proud of how quickly the pupils are learning about table manners and healthy eating habits. Since we have moved to the new building, our uptake of school dinners is at 96.8%

We have also invested in some high-quality picture books from suppliers who ensure characters are from diverse backgrounds, and whose storyline arcs are not defined by their disability/race/backgrounds. We are passionate about ensuring our pupils are represented in the books that we read and so excited about sharing these books with our pupils as they go through the school.
